Dementia State Plan Implementation Plan Dashboard

This document highlights progress made towards achieving strategies contained in the Implementation Plan for the Virginia Dementia State Plan 2024-2027. The Implementation Plan was created by the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Commission to fulfill a requirement of the Healthy Brain Virginia project funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. DARS is working to track efforts made by organizations across the state that fall under the Dementia State Plan.

Goal 1. Coordinate quality dementia services in the Commonwealth to ensure dementia capability.
